Civil War stories sought for Veterans Day ceremony

Do you have a Civil War story handed down through the generations? Did your great-great-great-grandfather fight at Manassas/First Bull Run? Did Great-Granny meet Great-Grandpa while nursing him back to health after an epoch Civil War battle?

The City of Walnut Creek plans to commemorate the 150th anniversary of the start of the Civil War at its 2011 Veterans Day observance. The ceremony begins at 11 a.m. Friday, Nov. 11 at the Leshar Center for the Arts.

The ceremony will honor the veterans among us today, while recognizing the long tradition of military service by highlighting the stories of Civil War veterans from local residents.

Library gets 'gold' for being green

Just in time for its one-year anniversary, the Walnut Creek Library received LEED Gold certification from the U.S. Green Building Council.

LEED (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) is a point-based system where building projects earn points for satisfying specific green building requirements. The Library's Green Building design elements include an Energy Star-rated roof; storm-water management; daylight harvesting control; use of recycled and regionally manufactured materials; water-efficient landscaping and plumbing; and a raised flooring system to provide efficient heating and cooling.

The Walnut Creek Library is the first building in incorporated Walnut Creek to achieve LEED Gold certification for new

construction.

The Walnut Creek Library opened on July 17, 2010. The \$39.9 million, 42,000-square-foot building was designed by Group 4 Architecture, Research + Planning, Inc., and built by West Bay Builders. Construction was managed by Gilbane Building Company. The project team included Assistant City Manager Lorie Tinfow and City Architect Chris Erdle.

The LEED Gold Certification is the latest piece of good news for the library. In May, the Library was named the 2011 Sapphire Partnered Project of the Year by the International Partnering Institute. Additionally, the Library was a finalist for 2011 Excellence in Design Awards sponsored by the Environmental Design and Construction magazine.

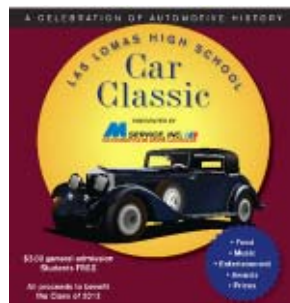

Author's appearance tops 'One City, One Book' line-up of events

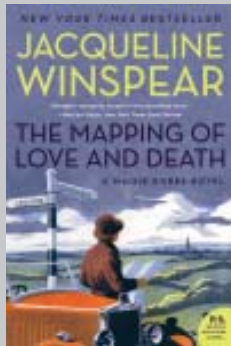
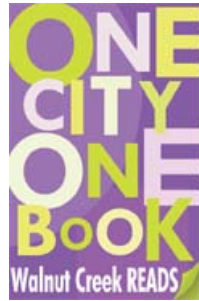

Fiscal health task force presents update to Council

The Community Blue Ribbon Task Force on Fiscal Health presented a progress report to the City Council on Aug. 2.

In February, the City launched the Task Force to develop and recommend viable, long-term solutions for the fiscal health of the City. Early in the process, the Task Force formed four subcommittees to manage and research specific topics.

The Demographic Changes and Growth subcommittee focused on current and past census data; interviewed stakeholders from local schools, real estate agencies, City staff and downtown retailers; and researched issues surrounding higher density housing, aging of City population, auto sales and economic development strategies.

The Capital Improvements subcommittee identified several focus areas including: various debt financing mechanisms; effect of capital improvements on operating expenses; funding and maintenance of the City's current and desirable assets; and other means of funding capital improvement projects.

The Delivery of Services subcommittee compiled data from several interviews with City staff on current and future levels of service delivery to residents, businesses and employees, including salary and benefits, permitting, outsourcing and the use of volunteers.

The Revenue Preservation and Enhancement subcommittee researched major sources of operating revenue to determine the sustainability of the sources; evaluated current cost recovery policies; and gathered information on the role of redevelopment on the City's operating budget and Walnut Creek's current position in the local, county and regional markets.

The Task Force is set to make a final presentation to the City Council in mid-November. Task Force meetings are the second and fourth Tuesdays of the month at 6:30 p.m. in the Main Street Conference Room (3rd Floor) at City Hall, 1666 North Main Street. Economic development strategy focuses on supporting innovative companies

The City is embarking on a new economic development initiative to grow its economy from within by focusing on innovative companies with potential for growth.

It is partnering with Grow-California, an organization that connects growth companies with sources of capital, talent and customers. Also participating are the Chamber of Commerce, Downtown Business Association and Contra Costa Council.

As a first step, Grow-California leaders held an "Innovation Boardroom" workshop on Aug. 1 at City Hall. Business leaders used a scorecard to assess Walnut Creek's readiness to support growth companies by rating Walnut Creek in

myriad areas, from availability of investment capital to employment options for spouses.

The scorecard results will help Grow-California identify things Walnut Creek and its community partners might do to support innovative growth companies. A second meeting in September will bring in growth businesses to get their insight into opportunities and obstacles.

The Innovation Boardroom is one example of the City's growing focus on economic development. In addition, the City is in the final steps of hiring an Economic Development Manager; look for more information on the City's website as it becomes available.

Commission study goes to City Council

A report by a Stanford Alumni Consulting Team (ACT) on the City's five commissions and four advisory committees was presented to the City Council on July 19. The study examined each of the appointed bodies' purposes and responsibilities, and made recommendations to increase effectiveness.

Based on the recommendations, the Council agreed that the five commissions will remain intact with some modification of duties, number of members and meeting frequency, as well as modification or elimination of their advisory committees. Changes will take effect in 2012.

John Muir Health ranked among best in nation, Bay Area

For the fifth consecutive year, John Muir Medical Center, Walnut Creek has been ranked one of the nation's top hospitals by *U.S. News & World Report* in its list of America's Best Hospitals.

John Muir Medical Center, Walnut Creek was ranked in the Top 50 nationwide in Orthopedics and Gastroenterology.

In addition to the national rankings, *U.S. News & World Report* published metropolitan area rankings. In the San Francisco Bay Area, 45 hospitals were surveyed. John Muir Medical Center, Walnut Creek was listed at number 2 and John Muir Medical Center, Concord at number 3.

In total, the two hospitals had 19 services nationally ranked or rated as high performing. Hospitals were rated based on four elements: patient survival, patient safety, care-related factors such as nursing and patient services, and reputation.

Back-to-school safety tips

It's that time of year again! The new school year is just around the corner. Here are some tips to keep kids safe:

- Pay attention to traffic around the school. Children have very little regard for their personal safety and may dart out to catch up with a friend or runaway toy.
- Obey the crossing guards. They are there to protect the children.
- Pick a spot to drop off and pick up your child. Make sure you both feel comfortable with it, as a child may say "Sure! That's fine!" and then forget where it is because it's complicated or seems too far from their classroom.
- Familiarize yourself with the school staff. If you know who should be there, you'll have a better feel for who *shouldn't*.
- Know your children's friends and become acquainted with their parents.
- Reinforce your family rules for going somewhere after school and checking in if your child goes home alone.
- Teach your children that a stranger is somebody they don't know, and that not all strangers are going to be scary or intimidating. In general, adults should not ask children for help. If an adult needs help finding something, they should ask another adult.
- Teach your children their home address, phone number including area code and the names of family members, as well as your employer's name and city. If your child needs help, it will be that much easier to find you.
- Check in with your kids on a regular basis. Ask them how school is going, how they're treating other kids and how they're being treated. Let them know how you expect them to behave toward others, and what you want them to do if they're being bullied at school.
- Teach your kids that police officers are there to help them, and show them how to dial 911.
- Monitor your children's activities.

Most important of all, enjoy this new school year! Have fun meeting new parents, teachers and students and look forward to all that school has to offer your children.

Honoring citizen crime-fighters

Continuing their tradition of recognizing everyday heroes, the Walnut Creek Police presented Citizen's Commendation Awards to Mark Moore and Misty Lohe on May 23.

Moore was in a downtown coffee shop in October when he heard someone yelling "Stop" and saw a man run out of the café with a necklace. Moore gave chase and caught the man, getting injured in the process. The suspect managed to break free and escape, but not before the police identified him.

Thanks to Moore's unselfish actions on behalf of a stranger, the suspect was arrested and the necklace was recovered, said Police Chief Joel Bryden.

Lohe was leaving a downtown parking

garage in November when a car alarm caught her attention. She spotted a man take a laptop computer out of a car through a smashed window, and then run toward the stairwell.

Lohe drove out of the garage and spotted the suspect entering a restaurant on Locust Street. She called 911 and described what she had seen. Police quickly arrived on the scene and arrested the suspect, who Lohe identified as the person she'd seen taking items from the car.

Lohe's willingness to get involved led directly to the capture of the suspect and the recovery of stolen property, said Bryden.

"Mark and Misty are deserving of the respect and admiration of the Walnut Creek Police Department," Bryden said.
